Residents share their perceptions about important topics in the Columbia Basin-Boundary region

The <u>2019 State of the Basin Subjective Well-being Report</u> is now available.

How satisfied are you with your standard of living? Over the last 12 months, have you made an effort to buy local, exercise regularly, or donate to a charity? How strongly do you agree or disagree that your community is a great place to live? How do you rate the quality of your local environment? These are just some of the survey questions that we asked Columbia Basin-

Boundary residents to better understand subjective well-being in our region.

The Columbia Basin Rural Development Institute (RDI) conducts subjective well-being research as part of the <u>State of the Basin Initiative</u>. This research collects residents' perceptions, experiences, and behaviours related to an array of important topics. This subjective data is an important addition to objective quality of life indicators reported on for the State of the Basin Initiative, as together they give a comprehensive picture of well-being for the Columbia Basin-Boundary region.

The subjective well-being survey engaged 400 residents in summer 2019, before the impacts of COVID-19. At that time, results indicated generally high satisfaction with both personal and community well-being. Most respondents said they have adequate leisure time and good job satisfaction, and believe they live in a high-quality environment. Many also recommended their community as a good place to live and were not considering moving. Consumer confidence was on the rise.

There are many factors that contribute to personal and community well-being. Results showed confidence in community leadership ability, but indicated some concerns around equity and inclusion. Most respondents indicated strong connections to friends and family, but showed more mixed results when asked about their level of civic engagement and time spent volunteering. The subjective well-being report also includes residents' opinions around access to key services, crime and safety, and environmental health.

These subjective well-being results, along with the State of the Basin's objective well-being indicators, provide important information to support decision-making. As we now experience the impacts of COVID-19, perceptions about personal and community well-being are changing. Future subjective well-being research can capture these changing perceptions and what this means for our region.
